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



Donation of life saving suction machines for new born babies are in dire need

About 27,000 bables are born in Dr. Jose Fabella Hospital every year. Many of those are born prenaturely or by mothers who had little or no prenatal care; an average of 140 children are admitted into intensive care daily. Premature bables often suffer from lung problems and intections. When their little lungs become infected they fill with fluid and phiegm, making it impossible for the little children to get enough axygen when they breathe. They are gasping for dir, Dr. Jose Fabella informed us that they did not have enough suction machines to remove the phegm and fluid. Springboard Foundation approached the U.S. Embassy Club (USEC) for finances

to buy the needed suction machines. USEC responded quickly and 10 suction machines could be bought for the hospital, thus ensuring the survival of many babies and bringing relief to their terrible sufferina.

Dr. Jose Fabella Hospital is a maternity government hospital, which serves young mothers, their infants and children. Due to insufficient funding of the hospital, they cannot afford to buy all the medical equipment they need. Doctors and nurses are unable to help without the equipment and if must be horrible to know you could help but are helpless due to lack of machines or medicines.

SMALL DONATION BIG IMPACT

Annette visited the Mangaphan Nursery, she noticed that teacher Lizz only had a very small blackboard to write on. It is very hard for the teacher to work without a big blackboard that all students can see. Springboard Foundation donated a large blackboard so that teacher Lizz can show the children what they need to learn. Even small donations such as this blackboard can have a large impact on the daily lives of the children and teachers!

The nursery is very a simple intervention to prepare the children for school. A good start to school life ensures that the children will do well throughout their school years. When we followed the progress of the children who attended the nursery last year, we learned that all of them are in the upper middle achievement class and their grades are very good on average above 85%. Therefore we consider our intervention a success.

Because no room for this is provided by the local government we had to search for a place to conduct the lessons; a local church is kind enough to let us use their premises during the week.

Outside Merville Sublidivision, in Sitio Manggahan, 350 families live in poverty. The only sources of income are the occasional jobs as housemarks or drivers and/or construction workers. The nursery not only helps the children to a better start in school but it also helps mothers and fathers with small children to fird jobs to support their families while the children are at the nursery.

BRIGHTER FUTURE

The Night High School Scholarship Program at Siena College is designed to provide quality education to students from low-income families. Student applying for the Night High School Scholarship Program undergo a rigorous selection process, including passing the standard high school entrance examination at Siena College, 2 sets of interviews and home visits. Applicants who pass all the requirements become Night High Scholars at Siena College and are taught the same lessons, by the same teachers as the requalra, paying students.

The scholars all reside in communities adjacent to Siena College, and graduated Grade 6 from public elementary schools in San Jose del Monte, Bulacan.

The Night High Scholars come from low-income families where fathers are usually jeepney or tricycle drivers: vendors or carpenters and mothers are usually unemployed. Mothers who contribute to the family income do so by taking on laundry, roning, or running small variety stores in their homes. Night High School is a 5-year program with classes that start at 100 pm and end at 8.00 pm. Because of the extra year in high school, scholars who graduate from the Night High School Program are more mature and better prepared for entering college.

This generous donation will go a very long way giving these scholars the education they deserve and assuring good future income which will make sure that they can provide well for their children.

Once a year, Springboard has the special pleasure to see the appreciation of the parents of the Night High School scholars at Stena College and experience the love and joy theyhave for their children and the people who give them a chance for such a prestigiou education. It is unusual to see parents of high school students participating in school events, but the parents of the Night High scholars at Siena College are all there.

Relief operations

More than 76,450 people were made homeless in Binan, Laguna; many still live on the top floors and roofs of their houses since 1 1/2 months, waiting for the flood to subside. Springboard Foundation worked with long time-partner Hope Worldwide Foundation to bring relief goods.

Looking down the flooded streets, we were reminded of the terrible flood after typhoon Ondoy in September 2009; we saw people wading through the water to reach dry ground, to get to work, school, or to do their shopping. Some made improvised bangkas (small boats) to use as transportation. The first place we conducted our relief operations was at Barangay San Jose, were 173 families are staying in the neighbourhood evacuation center. We needed to ride an improvised bangka to reach the evacuation center, and were quite surprised when we saw that the evacuation center was also flooded. The people were thankful to receive relief goods and grateful that we made to effort to visit them in their community despite the flood

Our second relief distribution in Binan, was in Broy. Dela Paz, where flood waters were chest-deep. 100 families were staying at the San Vicente Elementary School which has been temporarily turned into an evacuation center. The evacuation area has only 10 rooms to accommodate the 100 families, and it was hard for us to imagine that 10 families could live together in such a small room.

During our relief operations, I interviewed one of the mothers who is staying there with her 11 children. She told me what had happened to them during the flood. Her biggest fear during the rainy season is always that they might one day be trapped inside their home because of high flood waters. This time the water rose dramatically high but she was able to save herself and all her children, unfortunately there was no time to save her belongings. She always thinks about the safety of her children, and said that given the chance to be relocated, she would be more than willing to leave. Her house was still partly submerged in water at the time of our visit, she has tried to go back to her house to see if she could salvage some of their belongings, but was unable to enter because the water level is still chest-deep. Whenever it rains hard, she fears that their personal belongings get washed away, or are damaged by flood waters. Some of the residents of Brgy, Dela Paz prefer to stay on the roofs of their houses over staying in a crowded evacuation center. The flood water in the neighbourhood is full of garbage and sewage. We saw children swimming in water that was black and thick, plastic bags and other refuse float in the dirty water along with them. It is a place ready for disease to strike, and no end to the flood is in sight since the water level has dropped little in over a month. People need food, water, toiletries, medicines and clothing. Some houses have electricity; which is worrying because the outlets and lines are submerged in the water.

Rebuilding from nothing

Annette was impressed with what she saw when she visited our housing project in Baseco on July 18th. Springboard is funding the building material for 20 houses for families that lost their homes during one of the past typhoons. These families used to live right on the ocean, making their homes vulnerable to strong rains, winds. To avoid future calamities, for these families they were relocated to Baseco.

Ten houses are in different stages of construction - some are still just made of wooden frames, while others are completely built and even beautifully decorated. The work was done by the families themselves. The government allocated the lots to the families and promised to raise the ground level: Of course they haven't started yet. The families were left with no choice but to raise the ground themselves. One man told us that he had to get 50 small trucks of land fill (construction waste and soil) he had to bribe the guards 300 pesos each time to let him bring it to his place. The walkways in their community are narrow and I have no idea how they managed to bring the land fill to their homes.

First, we visited the day care and youth outreach center of Hope Worldwide in Baseco. They are our partner organization that organizes the building of the houses. All in all there are 90 houses to be build, but they are having trouble finishing them due to constant flooding in the area, and the government won't fulfill their promise of bringing in materials to raise the ground level. The families have been assigned the site for their new homes but most of them are stuck because the area is swamped. The conditions there are far from ideal for the people, but it will be much better once it is all done.

What made this visit so special were all the families I met there. I visited their new homes and saw their work and we started talking a little about their lives. The first home was built by a lovely lady, probably my age, who had built the original house and then used her own funds (she does manicures and pedicures) to add a second storey. She was there alone and while I looked around I heard JR (the Hope project manager in Baseco) say to her: "My condolences, I am so sorry for your loss." I asked what happened to the woman who had smiled so welcoming to me, expressed her gratitude for the help she received, and talked so casually with me about the weather and the hard time she had raising the money to make her new home nice. I was told that her 19-year-old daughter had died 2 weeks before. Her only child. She is a widow. Her daughter had become sick and they went to the local health center, but received little help other than being given paracetamol for the fever the young woman had.

Her daughter got sicker and started vomiting some vellowish fluids but they had no money to go to the hospital and she died. I could see the heartache in the woman's eyes and I was speechless and shocked, Thinking of my daughter who is just one year older and not wanting, nor, being able to imagine the pain it would cause me if that had happened to her. And yet she goes on thinking about how she can work harder to raise the money to finish her home.
