





beneficiaries & grants

Springboard Foundation facuses on 5 different areas, all for the improvement of the lives of the children in the Philippines. These are Health, Nutrition, Education, Community Development and Relief Operation. As stated on the illustrated graph, 29 28% of the completed projects were allotted to education amounting to 1,381,218 consisting of 135 scholarship grants, emergency relief operation amounting to 1,276,992,20 Peoso consisting of relief goads, home repork its for 151 families who had been victims of Onday and livelihood training skills for 170 participants. Health covered 27,4% of the total projects with 1,266,94,10 Pesas worth of medical equipment and renovation of extension of NICU word. Nutrition projects worth S17,627 Pesas involved essentialutificin programs and 5,15% of the completed projects were allocated to community development programs.

Fire Relief Operations at Baseco January 2010

Springboard Foundation, in partnership with Hope Worldwide, Metro Manila Christian Church, Metro Cavile Christian Church and community volunteers conducted a series of relief effort activities for the benefit of the fire vicitims of Brgy. Gasangan and Brgy. Aplayan in Baseco, Tondo. A fire razed the 2-black area of Baseco on January

A lite (dags) the 2-block deed of baseco on Jahody 14, 2010, killing one 5-yeer-oid gif and destroying the homes of 330 families, or 1,233 individuals. We conducted relief package and water distribution activities, puppet shows, feeding programs and spot medical services and vitramins distribution for the devastated residents of Brgy. Gasangan and Brgy. Aplayan.

Entertaining and educational puppet shows were put on by Hoge Worldwide for the children and youths of the community. The puppet show centered on themes of human rights and protection against physical and sexual abuse. Everyone who attended the puppet shows, as well as vicitins of the fire were served hat macaroni soup after the performances.

Volunteers of Hope Worldwide and parents of the community helped cook, pack and serve the hot macaroni soup during the feeding activities. Potable water was also provided to the families via a hose attached a barangay fire truck. Families lined up with their containers to collect water for drinking, cooking and cleaning their homes. Spot medical services were also provided with the help of Caroline Cliff, volunteer nurse from Springboard Foundation. Vitamins were distributed and first aid was administered to the children and youths. Nurse Caroline saw 50 patients who suffered from colds, coughs fungus and minor wounds The cooperation of many carina individuals from oragnizations as well as community volunteers was vital in making these relief activities a success for the benefit of all those who lost everything in the fire.
